



# **Becoming a Practice Assessor (PA)**

## Am I eligible?

Practice Assessors must be a registered Nurse or Midwife. PAs help students develop their professional competence and confidence, assessing their practice learning placements. They can support Pre-reg Nursing students, Trainee Nursing Associates, Pre – reg Paramedics, Pre-reg Social Workers, etc

#### How does the training work?

You will need to attend a full day e-learning course by <u>Pan London Practice Learning</u> <u>Group</u> and one day learning by <u>Canterbury Christ Church University</u>. Also you will need to complete a short competency document. For more information on the module click <u>here</u>

### Is there top up training?

Ideally Practice Assessors should undertake regular updates you will need to complete a half day e-learning course by **Pan London Practice Learning Group** or attend assessor meetings at Canterbury Christchurch University

### Will my practice support me?

Your practice should allocate you time to support the students Your practice should release you for your training

# What can I do as a PA?

- You are assigned a student to support and conduct assessments to confirm achievement
- Observe the student across environments in order to inform decisions for assessment
- Obtain support from the Practice Supervisors to assess the competencies of the student
- Collaborate and communicate with the student to achieve best practice
- Gather and coordinate feedback from relevant people, to be assured about your decisions
- Serve as role models for safe and effective practice
- Share current knowledge and experience of the area in which they are providing support

#### Is there a reaccreditation process?

For Nurses that have previously undertaken a recognised mentorship course, the half day e-learning course by Pan London Practice Learning Group is required for transitioning to a PA
